

Malborough Village Hall & Playing Fields Association

As we begin to plan for 2025, the trustees and committee can look back upon 2024 as a year of many very important developments within the estate.

A large number of significant and expensive improvements have been made to the premises during the year, including:

- new air-to-air heat recovery systems for both the main hall and the annexe
- total and comprehensive new fire and smoke alarm system to all parts of the premises, hardwired into the building and with remote control
- new emergency lighting in the main hall and the main kitchen
- · new lighting in the annexe
- new lighting in the main kitchen
- continued improvement and extension of the CCTV system throughout the estate
- continued maintenance and improvement of the quality of the fields

We have been delighted to welcome several new members to the committee during the year following our recruitment campaign in the summer, including Janet Rowse as Minutes Secretary and Steve Morris as Bookings Officer. Both have hit the ground running and their input and thoughtful ideas are already helping to improve the services we offer to our hirers.

Bookings on the year have increased steadily, and there are now very few days when something is not going on at the hall. Some sports facilities are underused, particularly our recently refurbished hard tennis courts. Anyone who would like to talk about the use of these courts, which is free to villagers, please contact our Sports Officer John Jevans, whose contact details are at the back of the Messenger.

Thanks to the work done on the fields with the support of KM football club and our contractors Cutting-Edge, the Football Association has declared itself as very satisfied with the condition of our fields and visiting players are often astonished at the quality of the turf. Unfortunately, there are still some local residents who resolutely refuse to follow our request that dogs are not allowed on the playing fields. This is an ongoing problem of an offence being committed by a small minority and we continue to monitor their activities with the help of our CCTV system. Further work is planned with the planting of more trees in the wood, a new hedge bordering the Salcombe Road, clearing back and replanting the bank between the play area and the football pitches, and making improvements to the accessibility to the tennis courts. As always, these plans will depend upon the limited financial resources available to the committee.

Finally, a date for your diaries. The Annual General Meeting will be held on Wednesday, 7th May 2025, meeting to start at 19:30 but doors will open at 19:00 and everyone is be invited to come along and talk to committee members and, who knows, perhaps offer to help us with the management of this important and valuable asset to our village.

A Christmas Thank You

The Parish Christmas Tree Festival was a huge success in many different ways. Not only did it raise a significant amount of money but more importantly it brought our Seaside Parish together in a shared experience which forged new friendships. The three churches of the parish worked together in the months of preparation before the festival and during the festival itself.

The team went out into the community to raise awareness of this new initiative, create interest, enthuse people with the idea and to follow up by encouraging people to enter trees and take part in the festival week. Each parish church took equal responsibility for running the festival on designated days by providing and serving refreshments as well as to welcome people. The home baking was much enjoyed by our visitors.

The initial idea of the Tree Festival came from Liz Hext at Malborough. Pauline Rendle, who was eager to raise funds for the parish, suggested holding a raffle and she, Christine Jarvis and Christine Kernot-Turner were highly successful in finding businesses to donate prizes. These prizes were added to by the generosity of many individuals from the parish. The raffle raised over £1,000, contributing to a grand total of £2,307.21 raised overall with further gift aid monies possible.

Sustainable Malborough & South Huish (SMASH)

A little bit of sunshine has poked its head out this afternoon, ahead of yet another storm, Storm Éowyn. But spring is on its way!

There was a SMASH meeting on 6th January and lots of good discussion including a review of activities last year. Three beach cleans, weed clearance around young trees, wildflower raking and seeding in various locations, replacement of heating in Malborough Village Hall annexe to air heat pumps, to name just a few.

This spring there is a plan to put in some new hedging plants, which will be done in March, after the weedsuppressing fabric is put down at the end of January. We're working with SHDC in relation to the orchard behind Eastacoombes in the hope that we can work with the landowner to maintain it as a space for the wider community.

Malborough may be a trial community for expert advice on energy reduction strategies for improving energy useage in homes. Awaiting a date for this. It is hoped to consider putting in flora/fauna information boards to show walks around the parish. We also talked about a community fridge/food swap too. Both Parish Councils will be invited to the next meeting to continue to foster good working relationships. Volunteers for work around the new hedging are very welcome — keep an eye on our Facebook page — SMASHCEB — for the dates. Next meeting is 3rd February, Old Inn, Malborough, 19:00.

Community Compost Scheme - we are still waiting for written confirmation from SWW for use of the site in Galmpton, although it has been agreed verbally, before we put in planning permission. We had a great meeting to promote volunteers for the scheme at the end of November with a fascinating talk from Matthew, one of the National Trust gardeners at Overbecks. We have several more people who are interested in helping with the scheme. We plan to have another meeting and talk in Hope Cove in March, so please keep an eye out for this on our FB page and posters around the parishes. If you are a local group and would like us to come along to talk about what we're doing, we'd love to hear from you!

The National Trust

The volunteers and rangers have been busy with lots of projects this winter. The FiPL access improvement grant work has been completed with a large section of the Bolberry Access Path resurfaced and a new accessible picnic bench installed for visitors to enjoy. We have also installed some 'trombone handles' on gates at Little Dartmouth and Snapes Point to make access easier for people with limited mobility.

The South Devon National Landscapes team and DEFRA funded some interpretative benches which have images of the landscape and wildlife at Southdown and Wembury. A 'spitfire' bench has also been installed next to the airfield

at East Soar Farm in recognition of the history of the farm being part of RAF Bolt Head airfield in the Second World War.

We have planted up around 200m of hedging plants to gap up a hedge at Snapes Point hedgerows around the farms are a really important feature,

providing shelter for livestock, food and nesting areas for a wild range of wildlife. The volunteers planted a mix of hawthorn, blackthorn, spindle, wild privet, wild cherry, field maple, guelder rose and juneberry which will provide a wide ranger of nectar and fruit.

Thanks to a donation we will be planting up a further area with trees in the field edge at East Soar Farm above Overbecks House to extend the woodland out into the field. The stewardship work has also been continuing at this farm with a replacement water system being installed to the troughs; the hedge planting on all the banks has been completed by Schalk; Kingsbridge Community College students also helped plant hundreds of these plants so thank you to them for their hard work in some difficult weather conditions - we look forward to seeing them establish over the next few years.

Further harvest mouse surveys this winter — hunting through dense tussocks of grass for their nests has shown we have really good numbers of one of our smallest mammals. They have a very adaptable diet but need fallow areas with thick grassy tussocks to safely make their nests, tucked away from predators.

With no December meeting our January meeting was full of business matters — adopting a number of policies and hearing about devolution matters from our County and District Councils. If this goes ahead it will mean more work for Parish and Town Councils as we will inevitably be asked to take on extra work like keeping planted grassed areas in the village tidy etc. With this in mind we voted for a small rise in our precept for the next financial year.

We also heard from our District Councillors about the new method of paying for council car parks by phone. Ringo is no longer available and the new method sounds as if it is not as user friendly! If you have problems please do tell us – meanwhile it's simpler to use cash!

CCTV is now being installed on the toilets in the Square and we very much hope this will reduce vandalism which has been an ongoing problem.

We look forward to a busy year and hope the Parish Council will be able to continue to improve our facilities and keep the village looking good. We appreciate that many of our residents keep their roadside boundaries neat and tidy so if your hedge overhangs or your bin is a mess please help by doing your bit too.

Finally good news that brown bin collections have started again after their Christmas break so if you pay for this system remember to put out your brown bin every fortnight! Also it is time to pay for next year — an early bird discount is available if you sign on before 31st March.

The end of January saw MAD's much-anticipated annual pantomime. This year's performance was Robin Hood & the Babes in the Wood.

Experienced director Jackie Plyer knocked it out of the park as usual with an outstanding extravaganza of comedy, song & choreography, the quality of which you'd not be remotely disappointed to see in the Theatre Royal or Palace Theatre.

There's always a great deal of talent in these shows, but particular highlights for me this year were Bryn Pratt as the pantomime dame Nurse Nelly, a role he seemed born to play; and Charlotte Hodgson and Tabi Pearce as Robin and Maid Marian. Rob Gidley was almost unrecognisable (with hair) as bumbling Friar Tuck, counterpointing James Richards' evil Sheriff of Nottingham who successfully angered the children on the front rows.

The supporting principals were also flawless – MAD has so much talent that it's hard to find a script which can make use of it all.

As always, the vast young chorus put in a great deal of work to excellent effect, with the choreography complex yet tight and the singing loud and melodic. We've seen many of the younger performers arrive at MAD as inexperienced kids and progress to being






confident, professional-grade dancers and singers. No wonder so many graduate from MAD into the world of performing arts.
